here's more than meets the eye to Miss West Virginia Elizabeth Lynch. This 25-year-old, originally from Martinsburg, is using her crown to get the word out about the importance of agriculture and how it impacts each one of us with her platform "Growing Up, Growing Ag: Advocating for Appalachian Agriculture.

"Think about where your food comes from. There are hard-working men and women out there who are making it possible for that food to make it to your plate every, single day. We need a deeper appreciation of where it comes from and who's responsible for that," stresses Lynch. "Go thank a farmer!"

Lynch, who won her state title back in February, will compete for the Miss America crown on December 15. She'll be up against 50 other women from across the country but is the only one promoting agriculture.

"I know there have been some local title holders across the nation that have had an agriculture platform in the past, but I personally don't know of any that have gone on to compete at Miss America," says Lynch.

Her passion for the land and animals started

"I may not have lived on a farm, but I sure grew up on one. I started riding horses when I was five years old and raising swine through 4-H when I was nine," Lynch recalls. "I got involved in FFA in high school and fell in love with it. The FFA creed begins, 'I believe in the future of agriculture.' I took that to heart. I had to figure out why I personally believe in the future of agriculture. I came to the realization we have no choice not to. Our farmers are responsible for ensuring our vast population is getting fed every day. A lot of people take that for granted. I wanted to become a part of the agricultural world for the rest of my life and be a part of the agriculture sustainability part of

After graduating from Musselman High School, Lynch set out on her own agricultural

"I received my bachelor's degree from Delaware State University," explains Lynch. "I graduated in 2020 with an Animal and Poultry Science degree and a minor in biology. I did research with ruminants, small sheep and goats. From there, I went to West Virginia University and got my master's in Nutritional Sciences with a focus on Applied Poultry Nutrition and Feed Manufacture Research."

During her college studies, Lynch also found time to compete in the Miss America pageant system. She found that lessons she learned years ago in 4-H and FFA were the perfect foundation.

"There are a ton of public speaking opportunities through 4-H and FFA, and that really gave me an 'in' to allow me to start my public speaking journey. That led me to the Miss West Virginia organization," she says. "I get the question all the time, 'How can you be involved in the Miss West Virginia organization and also be a farm girl?' As if those two things can't mesh, but in my mind, they do because I get the opportunity to advocate for an industry that definitely needs somebody to advocate for them!"

Earlier this year, Lynch began her passion project - Friday Farmer interviews.

"Every Friday, I release an interview with a farmer, someone with an agriculture organization or an agriculture business in the state of West Virginia. I ask what they do, how they contribute to agriculture, what is the best/ worst part of their job and what our community can do to help them. Not only does it give people an idea that agriculture is so much more than cows, sows and plows, there are many facets in the agriculture industry that you can get involved with that doesn't necessitate you being on a farm. It also gives you a great

picture of what is happening within West Virginia and our agriculture industry," explains Lynch. "I have so many interviews that you can explore for more information."

So far, Lynch has profiled Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt, USDA Aquaculture Biologist Mark Hostuttler, FFA Advisor Charity Marstiller (nominated for WV Teacher of the Year), FARMacy co-founder Dr. Carol Greco and many more.

"My crown is a microphone. We're supposed to use that crown to amplify our voices," stresses Lynch. "But I don't want just my voice to be heard, I want to amplify the voices of our agriculturists all over the state because it's not my story that's important, it's their stories!"

If Lynch wins the title of Miss America 2023, she'll spend the year traveling the globe, getting the word out about the critical importance of agriculture. If she doesn't, she has a new mission.

"My next move is to get my Ph.D. in One Health Sciences at Texas Tech University. I'll be working with food animals and parasites, figuring out how we can maintain a healthy relationship with our food for a sustainable future."

After becoming Dr. Lynch, Elizabeth hopes to become a professor at a land grant university (hopefully in West Virginia) and inspire other minds to pursue a degree in agriculture. She says her education was made possible by the Miss West Virginia organization.

"What drew me to the organization was the opportunity for scholarships. Miss America is the largest provider of scholarships to young women in our nation. Over the last five years, I've received more than \$16,000 in scholarships! But you don't have to win a title to get those scholarships. There are lots of opportunities at the local/state level to earn scholarship dollars."

A Reflection on our Freedoms

This fall, I was privileged to speak at the dedication of two Living Memorials remembering the fallen sons and daughters of West Virginia Gold Star families. As I spoke to the crowd, I remembered my own service overseas and how lucky I was to come home in one piece. Many of the men and women who have proudly served our country have not been as fortunate, including several that I have known personally. As we head into the holiday season and in the spirit of being thankful, it is vital we reflect on the blessings we have been given to live in this Nation. Take time to remember the sacrifices made by these men and women who have preserved our freedoms. Their memories serve as a reminder that freedom is never free.

To show we have never forgotten and to carry on the legacy started by Hershel "Woody" Williams, the Gold Star Mothers plan on planting Living Memorials in every county of the State. To date, they have planted five apple tree and two maple tree memorials. Each has 55 trees with one or more dog tags tied on them to represent a fallen West Virginian. We do this because every Gold Star mother will tell you their child dies twice - once at that fatal moment and again when their name is no longer mentioned. At every

dedication, Gold Star mothers tell us their child's name, as well as date and place of death. It is through these Living Memorials that their child's sacrifice lives on.

As the Commissioner of Agriculture, I am proud to partner with West Virginia Gold Star Mothers in planning and planting these memorials. These plantings not only benefit local communities but serve as a symbol that we will not forget those who have made the ultimate sacrifice. I encourage everyone to visit these beautiful and peaceful sites. Please pick out a tree or two and read aloud the name on the dog tags attached to the tree. Most of us cannot fathom what it is like to be a Gold Star family, but we can show gratitude by remembering those who they have lost. We do not take for granted the brave men and women these families raised.

Our dedication to honoring the fallen, as well as our veterans and those currently serving in the military, isn't isolated to just these memorials. Through our Veterans and Heroes to Agriculture program, we have made a commitment of working with our partners to create and expand services to our veterans and first responders. We have donated land to build a veteran's home. Our staff has worked to expand access to mental health services,

as well as resources for veterans who wish to transition from the battlefield to farm field. Each day we have staff working on how to help our veterans and first responders in West Virginia. Under my administration, we have made local heroes a top priority.

At the Department, we believe it's vital to continue to make these men and women a priority given the current state of foreign affairs. ANIMAL HEALTH BULLET

Equine Infectious Anemia

Multiple equines in South Carolina were recently infected with incurable Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) virus via using the same needle to inject multiple performance horses. Transmission of animal diseases can occur through re-use of hypodermic needles as well as sharing dehorners, ear taggers, nose tongs, rectal palpation sleeves, tattoo instruments, castrating knives or other instruments on multiple animals without cleaning and disinfection between uses. In addition to EIA, other blood-borne livestock diseases spread via these means including Equine Piroplasmosis, Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS), Bluetongue, Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD), Bovine Leukemia Virus (BLV), Bovine Viral Diarrhea (BVD), Bovine Anaplasmosis and Bovine Theileriosis.

BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR SPOTTED LANTERNFLY!



It's been a busy fall for the WVDA Animal Health Division. Three workshops/meetings were held during October and November to make sure our animal health employees, as well as our state/federal partners, are ready to respond in case of an animal disease outbreak in West Virginia. Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhard stresses the importance of being prepared for any animal disease outbreak that comes West Virginia's way.

"Our employees continue to hone in on their emergency response procedures and skills. No matter the source, we will be ready to help West Virginia and its industries," stresses Leonhardt. "It is vital to the security of our citizens that we know what to do when a crisis materializes."

Potential Animal Disease Outbreaks

As of mid-November,
West Virginia and Hawaii
are the only states without
a confirmed case of High
Pathogen Avian Influenza
(HPAI) in both poultry
and wildlife species. State
Veterinarian Dr. James
Maxwell says biosecurity
is more important than

ever with HPAI and other high-index animal diseases on our radar.

"Both within West Virginia and regionally, partnering with responders from local, state, and federal agencies, as well as engaging animal industry stakeholders, is critical for enhancing our overall preparedness, response and recovery capabilities if we incur a high-index animal disease event such as HPAI, Foot and Mouth Disease or African Swine Fever," says Maxwell.

On October 17, the WVDA held a workshop at the Pruntytown State Farm for the animal health staff to further educate them on diseases such as HPAI, Foot and Mouth and African Swine Fever. Our USDA partners also took part in the workshop, adding their knowledge and expertise to the discussion.

On October 18, veterinarians from the WVDA and USDA vets from several surrounding states took part in a Comparative Cervical Test (CCT) for tuberculosis. Hands-on training was conducted at WVDA's Pruntytown State Farm where veterinarians were able to perform CCT injections and learn to take caliper readings from cows. CCT is performed after a veterinary practitioner determines a reaction on a Caudal Fold Test for tuberculosis.

On November 2, the WVDA met with representatives of USDA-APHIS (Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service), Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, West Virginia National Guard, WVU Extension Service, WVU Davis College, WV EDM, along with other county/state/federal leaders to talk about HPAI and how the state can work with its partners if an animal disease outbreak did occur here in West Virginia. The meeting took place at the WV National Guard Armory in Moorefield.

The WVDA also held a webinar for West Virginia farmers in November that focused on secure food supply plans and the importance of having a plan in place on their farm.

HUNTERS HELPING THE HUNGRY

Since 1992, Hunters Helping the Hungry has donated more than 1 million pounds of venison to West Virginia's two food banks feeding some of the state's neediest families. With the help of the Governor's One Shot Hunt, Share the Harvest Sunday and other forms of private donations, there are no processing fees for hunters who designate deer for the program. Thanks to those generous hunters, 28,145 deer have been processed, providing 1.4 million meals to West Virginian families.

From the first day of any deer season until December 31, hunters who legally harvest a deer and wish to donate the meat to HHH can deliver the deer to the nearest participating meat processor.

The Mountaineer Food Bank and Facing Hunger Foodbank will then pick up the donated venison to be distributed among a statewide network of 600 charitable food pantries, senior centers, shelters and other feeding programs.





Happy Holidays!

As we prepare to deck the halls, there's nothing better than the smell of cookies baking in the oven to get you in the holiday spirit. The recipes we've selected this month are old, family favorites that have been enjoyed by generations. The sugar cookies taste even better when little hands help make them! If you bake up extra cookies, they are the perfect gift for a shut-in or even the non-baker in your life. Spread the cookie love! Sugar Cookies

- ½ cup butter (softened)
- ½ cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 3 egg yolks
- ½ tsp. vanilla
- 1 ¾ cup flour
- · Sugar crystals

Beat butter and shortening on med/ high for 30 seconds.

Add sugar, soda, cream of tartar and salt. Beat and scrape sides of bowl.

Beat in egg yolks and vanilla. Beat in one cup of flour, then add in the rest of the flour until the dough is completely combined.

Shape dough into 1-inch balls, roll in sugar crystals. Bake 2 inches apart on 300 degrees for 15 minutes.

Plan ahead. Dough rolled 1/4" thick will produce sturdy cookies, best for crumble-free transportation and kids' decorating. Dough rolled 1/8" thick will produce more fragile, delicate cookies but a larger batch!

Nut Rolls

Dough:

- 3 sticks butter
- 1 8oz. cream cheese
- 3 cups flour

Nut filling:

- 1 lb. chopped walnuts (or black walnuts)
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tbsp. butter
- 3/4 cups canned milk

Step 1

Mix 3 sticks butter, cream cheese and flour with hands until dough consistency. Store in refrigerator over night (at least 8 hours). Roll out dough, cut into 2x2 inch squares.

Cook nuts, sugar, 2 tbsp. butter and canned milk on stove until it combines and is hot.

Step 3

Put tsp. of nut filling on a dough square and roll from corner to corner. Roll in sugar and place on a cookie sheet two inches apart. Bake 350 degrees for 20 minutes

Royal icing (a mixture of powdered sugar and egg whites) is what gives bakery-made cookies their professional sheen. If the icing is too liquidy, add powdered sugar. If it's too thick, add milk or water.



Pizzelles (Italian Wazzles)

- 6 eggs
- 3 ½ cups flour
- 1 ½ cups sugar
- 1 cup of butter
- 4 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tbsp. lemon extract • 1 tbsp. orange extract
- (You can replace the lemon and orange extract with anise or vanilla)
- Powdered sugar (optional)

Step 1

Preheat your pazzelle iron. Beat eggs, adding sugar gradually. Beat until smooth.

Add cool, melted butter and lemon and orange extract.

Step 3

Sift flour and baking powder. Add to egg mixture. Dough will be sticky enough to be dropped by a spoon. Drop a tbsp. of dough on the center of pazzelle iron.

Step 4

Let it cook for 30-45 seconds, depending on the iron. Remove from iron and dust with powdered sugar, if desired.

Gingerbread Tips:

To make sticky gingerbread dough easier to work with, chill it for at least 1 hour before rolling it out.

Roll out the dough on a surface that's lightly dusted with flour or a mixture of flour and confectioners' sugar. If the dough isn't too sticky, you can roll it out between sheets of parchment paper.



Jackson County Regional Livestock Market Hosts WLAC Qualifying Event

There was a lot of fast talking going on at the Jackson County Regional Livestock Market on October 29 for the eastern qualifying round of the World Livestock Auctioneer Championship (WLAC). Twenty-seven of the best auctioneers from across the country gathered in Ripley to win a spot in the finals. Each auctioneer had eight drafts of livestock to show off their talents. The panel of judges were looking for clarity of the auction chant, professionalism and ability to conduct a sale while catching bids. West Virginian Ben Morgan, of Morgan's Real Estate and Auctioneering in Greenbrier County, finished in the top ten, punching his ticket to the finals.

"When I was a kid, I knew auctioneering was what I wanted to do," Ben says. "When they first started televising this competition, I thought, "Man, what would it be like to go and compete with those guys, just to get to meet some of them!" Now, some of those guys I was watching when I was seven are still competing, and they're some of my best friends. It's an honor to compete with them."

The WLAC finals will be held in conjunction with the National Livestock Marketing Association Annual Convention in June in Arcadia, Florida.


WVDA: What We Do

Loans are made for a term of up to 20 years and must be fully secured. The loan committee meets quarterly to review loan applications.
