FEES/TUITION, MEALS & LODGING

- A \$100 non-refundable deposit is required at the time of application for each class.
- The balance of the fee is payable 30 days prior to the first day of scheduled class.
- The workshops and seminars are offered with special package costs that include instruction, meals, and lodging.

Policies & Procedures

REGISTRATION:

- Class size is limited to maximize the learning opportunity—apply early to insure your place.
- These workshops are available without regard to race, national origin, sex or handicap.
- If the minimum enrollment is not met two weeks prior to the date of the class, the workshop could be cancelled and students offered alternate classes.
- Full payment of the class is due 30 days prior to the start of the class.
- A \$15 fee will be charged for any returned checks.
- If students do not receive a confirmation from Cedar Lakes staff, they must follow up to guarantee their registration was received.
- Cedar Lakes will not accept phone registrations. All registrations must be submitted via a registration form either through mail, email or online.
- ALL registrations will receive an email confirmation from Cedar Lakes confirming the receipt of the registration and deposit. If you do not receive a confirmation, please contact the Program Coordinator immediately.
- Cedar Lakes is not responsible for lost or incomplete registration forms.

DEPOSITS:

- All classes will have a \$100 non-refundable deposit*.
- Deposit must be submitted with the registration form, or a credit card may be taken over the phone.
- Because some classes may have waiting lists, students will not be enrolled until the full amount of deposit and registration form are received. Cedar Lakes does not guarantee enrollment in classes unless confirmed by the Program Coordinator.
- All confirmed enrollments will receive a confirmation from Cedar Lakes.

ACCOMMODATIONS:

- Cedar Lakes staff will make every attempt at accommodating special requirements for our guests, within reason.
- If you have any special accommodations, such as mobility or dietary requirements, please contact Cedar Lakes prior to your arrival.

CANCELLATIONS:

- We appreciate your understanding of our cancellation policies and willingness to abide by them.
 Because these classes require out of area travel for many of our instructors and students, we ask that you please help us to avoid unnecessary cancellations.
- Minimum enrollment must be met for classes to proceed, and late cancellations can often result in a class cancellation.
- Because of the costs associated with Cedar Lakes staff and instructors' time, transportation and materials, deposits will be non-refundable in all circumstances except emergency situations.*
- Any deposits applied for a class that is cancelled by Cedar Lakes will be refunded in full or transferred to an alternate class, at the student's discretion.
- Any outstanding deposits at the end of the year will be returned to the student using the original payment method.

Policies & Procedures

REFUNDS:

- All payments received (excluding the \$100 non-refundable deposit) are eligible for a refund if notice is received 30 days prior to the beginning of the class.*
- If notification is not given 30 days prior, the remaining deposit can be rolled over to a future class.*
- A complete refund will be made if Cedar Lakes is required to cancel a workshop due to insufficient
 enrollment. The student also has the option to transfer to another workshop or roll the deposit over
 to a future workshop.



BASKETRY: ELAINE SINCLAIR

INTRODUCING THE ART OF PENNY RUG MAKING: ELAINE SINCLAIR

In this beginner class, you will learn to make a civil war era beautiful hand stitched penny rug. Stitch with the blanket stitch, using felted wool on wool. Many designs to choose from. Everything furnished. Students need to bring fabric scissors and an ott light if needed for extra lighting.

Basketry (Ribbed)

BASKETRY (RIBBED): DEBBIE MARTZALL

Four basic ribbed baskets will be taught and completed. We begin with a small egg basket that will be completed the first day. This teaches the God's Eye and the basics of a ribbed basket. Second, we make a melon basket, then a potato basket (dyed reed may be used as part of this basket). We finish with a larger egg basket. Staining the baskets is optional, stains will be provided (all staining will take place outside.)

INTRO TO BLACKSMITHING: MICHAEL YOUNG



In this class week long class the students will be introduced to the fundamentals of forging steel using the hammer and the anvil. Students will learn

how to draw out tapers, create small scrolls, twists, and bend iron in order to create hand forged hooks. Students will be introduced to different styles of S-hooks and J-hooks with the goal of creating a three hook wall mounted coat rack. Student will be encouraged to use their own creativity and design skills to make a coat rack that they will be proud to display and use in their own homes. If time permits, students will be also make a steak flipper - just in time for the summer grilling season.

FIREPLACE TOOLS: MICHAEL YOUNG

In this weeklong class, students will be introduced to general forging methods as they work on



creating a fire poker, ash shovel, and broom. Different handle styles will be explored so that students can use their creativity and their own design skills to create functional tools for use in a fireplace or outdoor fire pit. Because of the advanced nature of these projects, some forging

experience will be helpful, but not required.

icicles that can be hung as decorations.

In these beginner courses, you'll learn the basics of crochet and counted cross stitch.



Students will learn basic stitches, abbreviations, types of yarn, combining stitches, and hooks used. From snowflakes to the



basic granny square, you'll learn the foundation for making many other crocheted items that can be adapted to as many items as your imagination will take you.

The counted cross stitch utilizes perforated paper and tiny glass beads that can be made into pins, pictures, magnets, clothing embellishments, or other decorations.

Mary Oliver called the five senses the "five rivers," and writers know that sense imagery is key to vivid writing. - Needles: #70 and #80 Microtex; 2.0 or 2.5 twin needle
- Rotary cutter with a new blade; 18" x 24" cutting mat
- Rulers: 6" x 24", 12 1/2" square, 6 1/2" square
- Scissors: Small, sharp scissors and paper scissors
- Basic sewing kit: pins, seam ripper, stiletto, marking pencils or pens

ACRYLIC: BOLD AND FREE: VIVIAN RIPLEY Paint:

 There are many different brands of acrylic paint. The most common ones are Liquitex, Golden, and Windsor & Newton. Other brands such as Maimeri Brera, Holbein, Van Gogh, Daler-Rowney, and Utrecht are fine too. I don't use student-grade paints like Galeria or Basics.

Paint Colors:

- My choice of colors may vary somewhat from yours. Obviously, you need some basics; I also include some personal favorites.
- Ultramarine Blue Cereulean and Cobalt Blue and Thalo Blue are also good.
- Cadmium Red Alizarin and Crimson are also good.
- Cadmium Yellow Hansa and Lemon Yellow are also good.
- Hooker's Green Sap Green, Thalo Green and Chromium Oxide are also good.
- Payne's Grey

- Dioxazine Purple or Permanent Violet
- Burnt Sienna
- Burnt Umber
- Yellow Ochre or Raw Sienna
- Cadmium Orange
- Titanium White
- (You don't need to start with all the suggested personal favorites, but you will need at least ten basic colors. Orange can be omitted at first. One color I love is Quinacridone Gold, which may be hard to find.)

Brushes:

- You may use bristle or synthetic brushes made for acrylic painting.
- Watercolor brushes can also be used.
- Please also bring a #4 or #6 round and a liner.
- You will especially need a 1" flat and a 1 ½" synthetic flat brush.
- As a suggestion for other brushes, I use a #10 (1" short flat), a #10 flibert, a #6 round, all Acrylix by ProArte. I also have #3 and #6 flat bristle.

Painting Supports:

 Canvas or canvas boards. You don't need to start with anything over 16 x 20 (but nothing smaller than 12 x 16). Some sturdy drawing paper or canvas in a tablet form to test colors.

Other Helpful Items:

 Large water containers, rags, paper towels, palette knife or painting knife, disposable paper palette, cling wrap if you want to save paint, water spray bottle, old toothbrush, table easel if you have one (or floor easel if you prefer), drawing pencil, eraser and a small sketch pad. A large piece of plastic (an old tablecloth works) is helpful to prevent table damage.

Call the instructor with any questions at 614-451-6254. You may bring examples of your work to the first class. Unless washed immediately, acrylics stains on clothing are permanent, so dress accordingly. Feel free to have fun.

PASTEL UNLIMITED: VIVIAN RIPLEY **Pastels**:

 Good brands are: Rembrandt, Grumbacher, Nupastel, Sennelier, Rowney, Holbein, Schmincke, and Unison. If you are purchasing for the first time, do not get the smallest box. Nupastel 96 complete set is perfect for the beginning. Rembrandt 60 half-size sticks are also good. Do not get oil pastels, Alphacolor, Weber, Yarka, or school-grade pastels. The instructor will have a few single sticks available.

Pastel Pencils:

 Bring what you have. If you are just starting out, bring any one of the following: hard charcoal pencil, or an earth-tone pastel pencil.
 Brands available are Othello, Conte, Pitt, and Derwent. You can also borrow one from the instructor. Do not bring colored pencils.

Portfolio:

 Flat, heavy, black cardboard type (20 x 26 or 23 x 31). Do not buy zippered case with handles. A flat portfolio can serve as your drawing surface, and also a place to carry paper. Do not buy flimsy brown envelope type. Any board you use should support 19" x 25" paper.

Newsprint:

• Tablet of 18 x 24 rough newsprint.

Paper:

 We will use Canson mi-tientes 19" x 25" or Fabriano Tiziano, same size. Neutral tones are best rather than dark papers. Sennelier la carte is possible. You may purchase paper at discount prices from the instructor.

Easel:

• If you use an easel, please bring it.

Other Items:

 Kneaded eraser, masking tape (not green or blue), sketch book and sketch pencil (HB, 2B or 4B), photo references. The instructor will also have photo references.

If you have any questions about supplies, please call the instructor at 614-451-6254.

You may bring paintings, framed or unframed to the class for the instructor to critique. Come for an unlimited good time!

WATERCOLORS: DEBBIE LESTER **Supplies**:

- I like Winsor & Newton paint.
- Ultramarine Blue and Antwerp Blue
- Gamboge yellow, Indian yellow
- Raw Sienna
- Burnt Sienna
- Permanent Rose and Alizarin Crimson
- If you have similar colors. You can use those.

Brushes:

 Wash brush synthetic bristles approx. 1 ½ to 2" wide, synthetic flat brush approx. ¾" wide, a round brush #8, and a rigger, long bristles for details, approximately 1" long.

Paper:

- You need a good quality paper. Those compressed pads you can get are only for color mixing and practice. I like Arches but there are good papers like Saunders, Fabriano, Kilimanjaro, Windsor & Newton. 140 lb cold press is what I use mostly. I order from www.cheapjoes.com.
- A palette for your paint, large enough to mix colors, paper towels, sponge, water container, masking fluid.

I will be bringing extra supplies in case you don't have everything.

STAINED GLASS: STEPHANIE DANZ **Supplies:**

- Disposable latex/nitrile gloves
- If you have your own tools, you are welcome to bring them
- Must wear closed toed shoes—no sandals
- Apron recommended

WATERCOLORS - FOG LIFTING: VIVIAN RIPLEY **Watercolor Paints:**

- BRING ANY WATERCOLORS YOU HAVE ON HAND!
- There are several very good brands of watercolor – Winsor & Newton, da Vinci, Holbein, Daniel Green, maimeriBlu, American Journey (Cheap Joe's), etc.
- Suggested colors: Aureolin Yellow, Cadmium Yellow Pale, Alizarin Crimson, Rose Madder Genuine, or Permanent Rose, Permanent Magenta, Ultramarine Violet (Daniel Smith), Cobalt Blue, Ultramarine Blue, Hooker's Green, Olive Green, Burnt Sienna, Raw Sienna, Some special ones from Daniel Smith: Green Gold, Quinacridone Gold, Indanthrone Blue, Paynes Grey.

Paper:

 300 lb. watercolor paper – Arches or Winsor & Newton (cold press or rough) are best. We will work on at least half a sheet of paper, not smaller. Good quality paper is essential. 140 lb. paper is good, but only if you have stretched it. If you bring watercolor paper from a spiral pad it will only be used to try colors.

Brushes:

 Get a selection of good quality watercolor brushes. You need brushes that hold an adequate amount of water and some that come to a good point. Bring a 1 ½" flat, No. 12 or 14 round (or larger), No. 8, 6 or 4 round and a rigger or liner. I also use a 1" flat, and ½" flat. Good quality synthetic brushes are fine.

Other Necessary Items:

- Masking fluid or Maskoid and applying tool
- Tissues and paper towels
- Painting board big enough to hold a half sheet (16" x 23")
- Palette with large wells essential, no small palettes with small round wells
- 2 water containers not small
- Spray bottle
- Toothbrush
- Pencils HB, H and one soft, kneaded eraser

- Masking tape not green or blue
- Sketch book
- Photo references with some good darks and contrast
- Easel, if you like one

The instructor will have 300 lb. paper for purchase at the class. You may bring examples to class. Most important: Bring a good sense of humor and a willingness to experiment! Vivian guarantees fun!!
