REGISTRATION:

- Class size is limited to maximize the learning opportunity—apply early to insure your place.
- These workshops are available without regard to race, national origin, sex or handicap.
- If the minimum enrollment is not met two weeks prior to the date of the class, the workshop could be cancelled and students offered alternate classes.
- Full payment of the class is due 30 days prior to the start of the class.
- A \$15 fee will be charged for any returned checks.
- If students do not receive a confirmation from Cedar Lakes staff, they must follow up to guarantee their registration was received.
- Cedar Lakes will not accept phone registrations. All registrations must be submitted via a registration form either through mail, email or online.
- ALL registrations will receive an email confirmation from Cedar Lakes confirming the receipt of the registration and deposit. If you do not receive a confirmation, please contact the Program Coordinator immediately.
- Cedar Lakes is not responsible for lost or incomplete registration forms.

DEPOSITS:

- All classes will have a \$100 non-refundable deposit*.
- Deposit must be submitted with the registration form, or a credit card may be taken over the phone.
- Because some classes may have waiting lists, students will not be enrolled until the full amount of deposit and registration form are received. Cedar Lakes does not guarantee enrollment in classes unless confirmed by the Program Coordinator.
- All confirmed enrollments will receive a confirmation from Cedar Lakes.

ACCOMMODATIONS:

- Cedar Lakes staff will make every attempt at accommodating special requirements for our guests, within reason.

Basketry

BASKETRY: ELAINE SINCLAIR

BEGINNER



INTERMEDIATE



ADVANCED



Having fun with color is a class for all levels of weavers, from beginner to advanced. In this class you will learn many techniques as you design and weave your baskets. We will incorporate various colors into your creations. This is a non-stressful, entertaining, fun week. Everyone works at their own pace. *Colors may vary.

Second, we make a melon basket, then a potato basket (dyed reed may be used as part of this basket). We finish with a larger egg basket. Staining the baskets is optional, stains will be provided (all staining will take place outside).

INTRO TO BLACKSMITHING: MICHAEL YOUNG

In this weeklong class, the students will be introduced to the fundamentals of forging steel using the hammer and the anvil. Students will learn how to draw out tapers, create small scrolls, twists, and bend iron in order to



create hand forged hooks. Students will be introduced to different styles of S-hooks and J-hooks with the goal of creating a three hook wall mounted coat rack. Student will be encouraged to use their own creativity and design skills to make a coat rack that they will be proud to display and use in their own homes. If time permits, students will be also make a steak flipper - just in time for the summer grilling season.

Embark on a weeklong journey into the art of sculpting the human face, designed for beginner sculptors eager to refine their craft. Each day of the course focuses on a specific facial feature, allowing students to gain in-depth knowledge and handson experience. Starting with the fundamental structure of the skull, participants will progress to sculpting individual elements such

as eyes, nose, lips, and ears. The instructor will guide students through anatomical nuances, proportions, and techniques to capture expressions and subtle details. By the end of the week, participants will have developed the skills to create lifelike facial sculptures, equipped with a deeper understanding of artistic anatomy and the confidence to apply these techniques in their own creative projects.



BEAUTIFUL BOUNTIFUL BLOSSOMS: JUDY LILLY

Supplies:

- Sewing machine in good working order with manual, ¼" foot, free Motion foot, open toe foot.
 Flat sewing surface is helpful.
- Power strip and extension cord
- Basic sewing thread and lightweight bobbin thread
- Monofilament thread in both clear and smoke
- Microtex size #70 sewing machine needles
- Sharpie with FINE point—not extra fine
- · Small iron and ironing surface
- Rotary cutter and 18 x 24 cutting mat
- Rulers: 6 x 24 and 12 ½ or larger square ruler
- Other: pins, small, sharp embroidery scissors and paper scissors, stiletto, marking pencils or pens, seam ripper, chair cushion, Prismacolor pencils if you have them.

Fabric, Etc.:

- 2 yards Wonder Under
- 20" x 24" piece of Golden Threads tracing vellum, muslin, Totally Stable, batting and backing
- ½ yard fabric for blossoms = White (#1 value)
- Fat quarter of the following:
 - Palest blue or violet (#2 value)
 - Pale blue or violet (#3 value)
 - Blue or violet (#4 value)
 - Med blue or violet (#5 value)
 - These values will be used for the shaded, shadow areas of the white blossoms so they should be subtle colors—not bright!
- Centers:
 - Daisy: small pieces of 4 values of gold to brown
 - Hibiscus: small piece of soft gold
 - Dogwood: small piece of mottled gold/ green
 - Magnolia: small pieces of multicolored earthtones
- Foliage: 3 or 4 shades of greens from light to dark
- Background: 3/4 yard of an interesting dark fabric
- Thread: Embroidery weight thread in colors that go with all the fabric you have brought to use.

Other:

• We will be studying various aspects of machine

- quilting and thread painting one day of the workshop.
- Please bring some sandwiches of cheap fabric with a cotton blend batting between for practice. I usually work on 12 x 12 sandwiches. I have a lot of things to show you that I believe will make your quilts better—contour stitching, echoing, grid work, embellishing with felts, etc..

STAR CONNECTION QUILT: JACKIE MILLIKEN

Supplies:

- Pattern (you may already have or I will have them)
- Sewing machine in good working order with 1/4 foot
- Rotary cutter
- 18" 24" cutting mat
- 6" 24 ruler
- Tri-Recs tool set

- Neutral sewing thread
- Basic kit: pins, scissors, seam ripper, stiletto, etc.

WORLD WAR II QUILT-MAKING: KATHY SAUNDERS

Fabric Supplies: It is incredibly hard to give exact amounts for fabrics as students choose their quilt size in class. Please consider this as a guide. I am making a full size quilt using the block above. Here are my suggestions:

- A wide variety and assortment of 30's and 40's fabrics. I bought 30 fat quarters which gave me a good selection.
- Background fabrics for blocks. 5-6 yards should be sufficient to make a good sized quilt. This can be all one fabric or a variety. I used white which would have been popular at the time.
- Blue fabric if making above quilt. I bought 3 yards and plan to use it in piecing and binding.
- Other fabrics might include a different choice for binding. The amount would be based upon how big of a project you make. Buying a yard for this would be ample. It is not necessary to have during class.

Other Supplies:

- Sewing machine in good working order that you know how to troubleshoot. (Bring your manual.)
 Please bring feet for 1/4" piecing and appliqué and extra needles.
- Rotary Cutting Equipment-Board, cutter, rulers. (We will be making lots of Flying Geese for the blue/ white segments. My favorite tool for geese is the Wing Clipper by Deb Tucker. I will bring mine.)
- Thread for piecing and appliqué. I used 40wt black for Scottie Dog appliqué and 50wt for piecing.
- Other personal stitching items you like to use.
- (Seam ripper, small scissors, etc.)

- Permanent Rose and Alizarin Crimson
- If you have similar colors. You can use those.

Brushes:

• Wash brush synthetic bristles approx. 1 ½ to 2" wide, synthetic flat brush approx. 3%" wide, a round brush #8, and a rigger, long bristles for details, approximately 1" long.

Paper:

- You need a good quality paper. Those compressed pads you can get are only for color mixing and practice. I like Arches but there are good papers like Saunders, Fabriano, Kilimanjaro, Windsor & Newton. 140 lb cold press is what I use mostly. I order from www.cheapjoes.com.
- A palette for your paint, large enough to mix colors, paper towels, sponge, water container, masking fluid.
- I will be bringing extra supplies in case you don't have everything.
