William H. Gillespie is a native of Webster County, West Virginia. Following his elementary and secondary education, he was admitted to the West Virginia University (WVU) College of Agriculture and Forestry. He completed the bachelor of science in forest management in 1952 and master of science in 1954, with emphasis in forest pathology, botany and geology. He also completed three additional years of graduate education at WVU with studies in forestry and geology.

Mr. Gillespie is a registered professional forester; nationally certified forester of the Society of American Foresters; Candidate Member of the Association of Consulting Foresters and an elected Fellow in the Society of American Foresters. He is currently the owner of Gillespie Forestry Services, a forestry consulting firm with offices in Charleston and Webster Springs, West Virginia, and William H. Gillespie and Associates, a plant biostratigraphicalgeological consulting firm, in

Charleston, West Virginia.

Prior to establishing these firms, Mr. Gillespie was director of the West Virginia Division of Forestry and Administrative State Forester. Previously he had served as deputy commissioner of agriculture and, prior to 1969, served as assistant director and director of Plant Pest Control Division, state supervisor of Forest Insect and Disease Work and as a forest biologist. Concurrently, he has served since 1978 as Paleobotanist in the Department of Geology and Geography, WVU College of Arts and Sciences.

Mr. Gillespie has received numerous State and national awards, recognitions and citations, including having scientists name two genera of plants to his honor.
